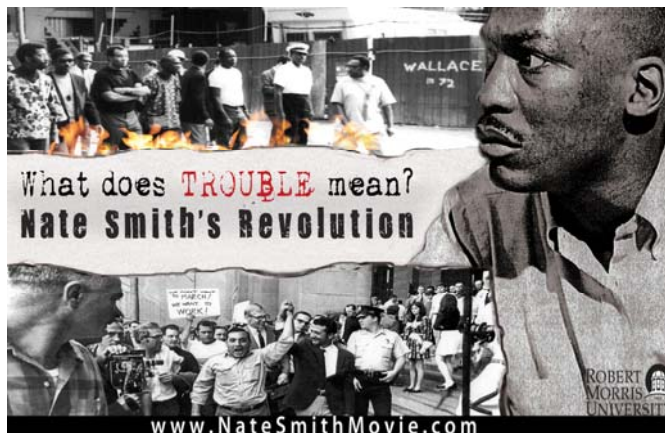


What to expect at the 14th Summit Against Racism

The Legal Framework for the 14th Annual Summit Against Racism is the **Universal Declaration of Human Rights**. We also want to contextualize today's struggle against racism with the legal strategies of Dennis Brutus and Lucinda Todd.

- **Dennis Brutus**, a truly international strategy for stopping police brutality and ending South Africa's Apartheid.
- **Lucinda Todd**, organizing the Topeka, Kansas community to testify against segregation in America and a high quality public education for black children.

Exciting resources at this workshop include: The Fraternal Order of Police union contract with the City of Pittsburgh, summaries of the four pieces of Jordan Miles/Police Accountability legislation, the 2011 October 22 Call To Action, the District Attorney's 2009 Tazer Report and Recommendations, "use of force" and racial stop and frisk data from each of the 154 police departments in Allegheny County.

This workshop will explore how the Greater Pittsburgh Coalition Against Violence (CAV) is building a movement for Social Change by looking at the components of this training on active nonviolence provided by the national organization, Creating A Culture Of Peace. The innovative design of this program provides a holistic and practical foundation in spiritually-grounded active nonviolence, where participants come to recognize their own power for making personal and social changes without violence. CCP emphasizes two forms of active nonviolence: Constructive Nonviolence "calls us to maximize our time and effort to create a just and peaceful *alternative* culture through new relationships, new practices, and new institutions". Nonviolent Resistance "challenges us to protest injustice and oppression and to protect the oppressed." The Greater Pittsburgh Coalition Against Violence in its work is a great example of both forms of active nonviolence. CAV's vision is to see "Safe, peaceful and just communities for all" and its mission is to create and implement a comprehensive anti-violence strategy for Pittsburgh and the nation.
